Pope Francis' Five Finger Prayer

- **2.** The next finger is the index. Pray for those who teach you, instruct you and heal you. They need the support and wisdom to show direction to others. Always keep them in your prayers.
- **3.** The following finger is the tallest. It reminds us of our leaders, the governors and those who have authority. They need God's guidance.
- **4.** The fourth finger is the ring finger. Even that it may surprise you, it is our weakest finger. It should remind us to pray for the weakest, the sick or those plagued by problems. They need your prayers.
- **5.** And finally we have our smallest finger, the smallest of all. Your pinkie should remind you to pray for yourself. When you are done praying for the other four groups, you will be able to see your own needs but in the proper perspective, and also you will be able to pray for your own needs in a better way.

Give Your Kids a Virtue Workout

vir·tue □v□rCHo□o/noun 1, behavior showing high moral standards. 2. synonyms: goodness, virtuousness, righteousness, morality, integrity, dignity, rectitude, honor, decency, respectability, nobility, worthiness, purity.

Intentional-Family: What does it mean to show high moral standards and how on earth do we teach our kids to do it?

To me, living a life of virtue is vitally important because it is the doing of our faith. Virtue is the action. We have knowledge and beliefs and attitudes, all of which are important foundations to virtue but not as important as actually showing virtue. Virtue is something that requires action, because when done right it should be a visible characteristic. Looking at the list of synonyms from the definition above, they are almost all observable. They are things that have to be demonstrated. If virtue remains inside is it really virtue?

Our family is active in martial arts and the life skills curriculum we follow there dovetails nicely with our faith training. We even use a lot of the same language to talk about various focus areas and tie the two together, whenever possible. As a part of our Taekwondo training, we learn one-steps that are short sequences of moves matched to a set of words that define the life skill. For example, "Self control! Controlling my actions, self control."

Among the great communion of saints are individuals who have made their faith training a priority. They studied, they prayed, and then they practiced. Again and again and again. We are not saints yet, so to become saints we need to learn from those who have gone before us and get serious about our faith training to build a life of virtue. We can begin with study and with prayer, and then we can practice. We wouldn't (or shouldn't at least) hop on a treadmill and start with long distance goal. In the same way, we don't become saints overnight. Think couch to 5K, not ultra-marathon.

I can't really give you one system that will guarantee a virtuous home. As in any sport or academic pursuit, it is time and practice that will build the tools necessary for success. Study the virtues as a family and pray for guidance in choosing those areas you will train. When you have studied and trained one virtue, keep practicing and start the process again with




WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Where does the Pope get his authority?

Matthew 16:18 is key to understanding Christ's intent to pass on authority to lead the Church to Peter and the apostles. Christ tells Peter that he is the rock on which He will build His Church. When. Catholics use the term apostolic succession, they are referring to the line of bishops that stretches all the way back to Peter, the first Pope. Apostolic tradition (the authentic teaching of the apostles) was handed from Christ to the apostles, and from them to their successors. This unbroken line of popes and all other bishops have guided the Church for the past 2,000 years, just as Christ intended. Christ sent his apostles out into the world with authority to teach, heal, and forgive sins. This Godgiven authority is exercised by the bishops within the Catholic Church to this day.

St. Anthony of Egypt (251-356)- January 17

St. Anthony was born into a wealthy Egyptian family. At age 20, his parents died and left him with a large estate and placed him in charge of his sister. He felt overwhelmed and turned to God in prayer.

Gradually he became more and more aware of the power of God in his life. Anthony sold most of his possessions keeping only enough to support himself and his sister. He gave the rest of the money to people who needed it. Anthony's sister joined a group of women living a life of prayer. Anthony decided to become a hermit. He visited other hermits to learn each one's outstanding virtues, and then began his own life of prayer and penance alone with God. Anthony was well known for his wisdom and holiness. After years of solitude, he gathered those who followed him into the first monastic community. St. Anthony died after a long, prayerful life. May we share his desire to find Christ both in solitude and in community with others.
